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INTRODUCTION

Welcome 2022! The past two years has brought uncertainty in unprecedented times, the whole world has been affected by the Covid 19 pandemic. Covid has had a significant impact on the provision of public services, management of assets and facilities. During the pandemic Caldicot Town Council modified working practices to comply with Central and Devolved Government public health directives.

- > The implication of the directives required that the Council take swift action to ensure that all directives, that were amended from time to time, were complied with by the Council and its Staff as far as it was reasonably possible to do so.
- The Town Council approved policies which enabled staff to home-work. Staff were provided with relevant equipment, to facilitate home-working and to ensure that attendance at the Town Council's offices remained flexible, in order to comply with the devolved government's public health directives as amended from time to time;
- > The Council developed the capability to host remote and hybrid Council meetings, using Starleaf technology; both to protect staff, members, and members of the public and to ensure that the democratic process continued to be as widely available as possible;
- Whilst adapting to challenges of the public health measures imposed by Central and Devolved Government, Caldicot Town Council continued to provide facilities and maintain services for the community and ensured that ordinary Council business was fulfilled;
- Dewstow Cemetery remained open for visitation and graveside services with limited attendance. The Town Council staff worked closely with funeral directors, to ensure that regulations, as amended from time to time, were adhered to;
- The play area and public toilets were reopened during the financial year, in accordance with the prevalent public health directives;
- The Town Council building has reopened to the public;
- > Groups resumed hall bookings during the period from the 1st April to the 30th September 2021 in accordance with the prevalent public health directives as amended from time to time.
- > The Council has demonstrated its commitment to supporting residents in setting the budget for 2022/23 has retained the level of precept same as 2021/22. This decision was made to assist the community as the Covid recovery continues

The law requires that Community and Town Councils produce Annual Reports to inform and engage with residents, this report explains what services have been provided by Caldicot Town Council during 2021-2022.

OVERVIEW

Caldicot is located in the South of Monmouthshire, with approximately 12,000 residents, surrounded by the smaller communities of Rogiet, Portskewett and Caerwent.

Caldicot Town Council is one of the Councils in Monmouthshire required to demonstrate how the authority is working towards the Monmouthshire Public Service Board well-being plan objectives. The Annual Report 2021-2022 highlights progress that Caldicot Town Council has made in relation to tackling local issues and working with partners, in order to benefit communities.

Caldicot is split into wards and these were changed prior to the 2022 Election. The Town Council comprises of 16 members covering six wards of Caldicot castle, Caldicot Cross, Dewstow, Severn, Village and west End. 15 members were elected to the Town Council in May 2022, with one member co-opted later that month.

DECISION MAKING

Caldicot Town Council, as a body, is responsible for making decisions and managing public money.

The Council is open and transparent in decision making and spending, all decisions are published within 7 days of a meeting being held.

Town Council meetings are held monthly at 6.30pm (last Wednesday of each month - except August and December), Planning & Resources Committee meetings are held monthly at 6.30pm (second Tuesday of each month) - further details can be found on the website www.caldicottc.org.uk

All meetings are open to the public and there is an opportunity for the public to contribute, to matters on the agenda.

Caldicot Town Council serve the residents of Caldicot and is responsible for a number of assets and facilities, which include Dewstow Cemetery, Jubilee Way Toilets (supported by Mon CC), King George V Playing Fields, allotment sites and Dog Waste Bins.

Details of finance, policy documents, Council activity and additional information about the Council can be found on the website.

Caldicot Town Council is a separate body to Monmouthshire County Council, therefore, manages different functions and responsibilities.

MONMOUTHSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

Monmouthshire County Council is responsible for services including education, health and social services, leisure, refuse and recycling, street cleaning, highways - both roads and pavements - street lighting and libraries.

The library/hub is the base for Monmouthshire County Council and officers would be able to assist with queries relating to Council Tax, Education, Health, Highways, Leisure, Social Care and Street Lighting.

BUDGET AND AUDIT





Finance and governance management

Community and town councils in Wales can:

- review the financial management, governance and accountability arrangements they have in place; and
- consider how effective these arrangements are, and how they might be improved.

Community and town councils are a tier of local government, with idnividuals working at a local level for community engagement and improvement.

Caldicot Town Council has to meet a number of legal requirements, this includes setting a budget and managing public money. By law, councils need to ensure they safeguard, properly account for, and use the public money they have been entrusted with economically, efficiently and effectively. The Town Council budget includes provision for a cemetery, public toilets, dog waste bins, playing fields, play areas, CCTV, christmas decorations and events.

The Town Council office is located centrally within the town and managed by the Clerk, the Town Council staff administer decisions made by Caldicot Town Council as a body. Community and town councils are also responsible, and accountable, for the conduct of public business and for spending public money.

Councils can monitor and review the activities throughout each year, these can be identified within annual report and further reviews can be done through a self-assessment. Caldicot Town Council is committed to serving the community and engaging with residents.

In demonstrating openness and transparency for the future, Caldicot Town Council will monitor the financial and governance management by reporting findings within the annual, along with planned actions.

Financial Statements and Auditor's Report

For a number of years Caldicot Town Council has received an unqualified opinion from External Audit. This means that the Auditor is satisfied with the Councils financial reporting and management.

All documents relating to the financial management of the Town Council are publicly available, this includes; Internal and External Audit reports, Annual Accounts, Budgets, Members Expenses.

General Power of Competence

Legislation was introduced in 2021 which provided additional powers to qualifying Councils. The legislation introduced the General Power of Competence (GPoC) under the Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021,

GPC gives local councils confidence to act for their communities. It encourages councils to use this power to work with others in providing cost-effective services and facilities in innovative ways to meet the needs of local people. If another authority has a statutory duty, then it remains their duty to provide that service (eg education, waste collection, social services) but local councils can still help out. For example, a local council can support a school in many ways, just as an individual might. It could even help a community trust to run a local school.

Criteria for eligibility and reaffirming eligibility

The freedom of the GPC is available to local councils that meet three criteria for eligibility:

- 1. That at least two thirds of the total number of Councillors of the council have been declared elected.
- 2. A qualified clerk.
- 3. The council has unqualified accounts which have been received by the council during the previous twelve month period ending on the day that the resolution to adopt GPC is considered by the council.



Caldicot Town Council, at the meeting on 29th June 2022, resolved eligibility and adopted the General Power of Competence (GPOC) (Wales). This will be reviewed by the Council at the Annual Meeting (usually held in May).

Caldicot Town Council

Introduction and Context

- Caldicot Town Council is a public body within the South of Monmouthshire.
 Caldicot is a built-up area with approximately 12,000 residents and a variety of buildings and land.
 - The Council assets include its own building, a small woodland area, playing fields, play area, allotment sites, cemetery and public toilets.
 - Caldicot Town Council is subject to reporting under the Well-being of
 Future Generations Act and links into Monmouthshire Public Service
 Board, all aspects of the Well-being of Future Generations are presented
 within the Annual Report.
- Based within Monmouthshire, Caldicot links in with the Local Nature
 Partnership, climate champions and Keep Wales Tidy.
- The Council obtains advice from an ecologist in aspects of work, as required.
- The Council is registered as a litter picking hub, through Keep Wales Tidy.
- The Community orchard has been developed and plans are in place to develop further and increase biodiversity
- Cemetery land has been developed, with increased planting of trees/hedges
- Environmental group, linking in with Monmouthshire County Council priorities
- Tree planting for queen's jubilee and following covid pandemic
- The Environmental and Climate Change working group has been established to look at priorities further, going into 2022/23.
- The Town Council is a consultee on planning applications and will comment as requested.

Barriers and challenges

- The covid pandemic was a major barrier. However, it demonstrated how facilities such as allotments and open spaces were still well used and could improve mental health.
- Resources are limited, therefore, relationships have been developed with Keep Wales Tidy, One Voice Wales – in order to share information and best practice with others.
- How enhancing biodiversity contributes to and is affected by your organisation's functions and strategic objectives. For public bodies subject to the WFG Act, how is the duty linked to delivery of the goals, particularly for a Resilient Wales, and the 5 ways of working.

Future ambitions

- Developing the Town Council building, including green energy considerations
- Facilities for Electric vehicle charging point
- Looking ahead, Caldicot Town Council is committed to environmental issues and developing biodiversity, through the community orchard project (partnership with Keep Wales Tidy), tree planting (Welsh Government initiative), woodland trail (developing Town Council asset).
